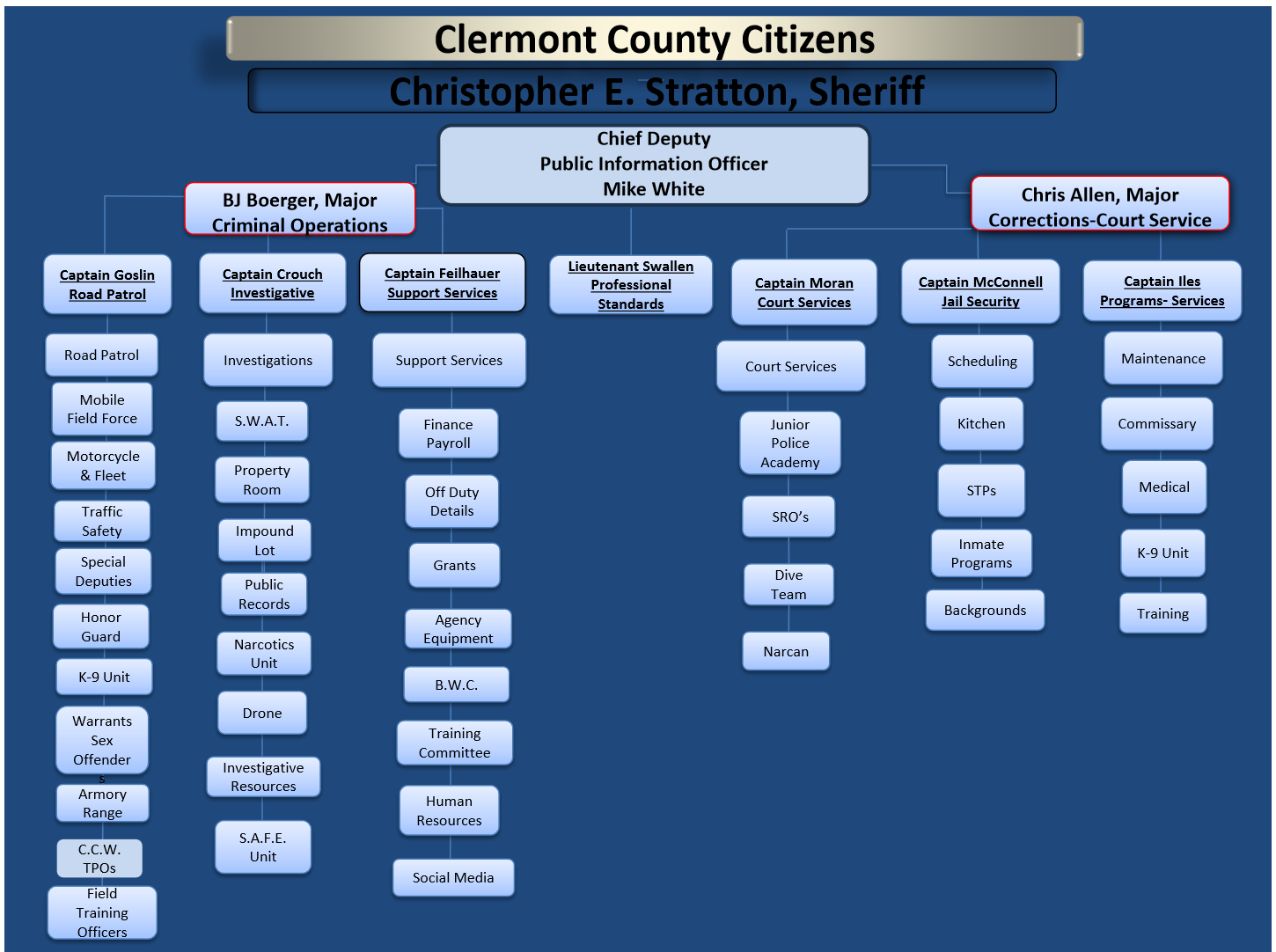

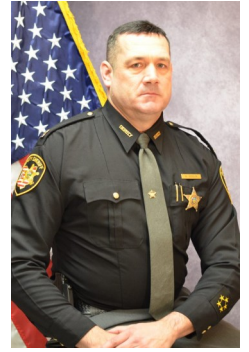




Patrol Division



The Road Patrol Division represents the primary operational arm of the Clermont County Sheriff's Office, to which the majority of the department's uniformed deputies are assigned. This division is under the command of Captain Nick Goslin, who oversees all road patrol operations. Uniformed deputies assigned to the Road Patrol, equipped with marked patrol vehicles, function as the principal first responders to calls for service throughout Clermont County. The Sheriff's Road Patrol serves as the primary law enforcement agency for the county's villages and ten townships, while also providing coverage to additional jurisdictions through contractual agreements or enhanced service arrangements. The division's core responsibilities include, but are not limited to:



- Conducting proactive patrols in assigned areas to deter criminal activity and promote public safety;
- Responding expeditiously to both emergency and non-emergency calls for service;
- Enforcing applicable traffic laws and conducting thorough investigations of motor vehicle collisions;
- Performing preliminary investigations of criminal matters and effecting arrests as warranted;
- Executing court-ordered processes, including the service of legal documents, evictions, repossessions, and related property seizures.

The Road Patrol Division collaborates closely with other specialized units within the Sheriff's Office—such as the Investigations Division, K-9 Unit, Special Response Team, Drone Unit, Dive Team, and Traffic Safety Unit—to ensure integrated, comprehensive, and continuous (24-hour) law enforcement services for residents, businesses, and visitors in unincorporated areas and those jurisdictions served under contract.



Calls for Service

Sheriff's Patrol Deputies responded to 48,648 dispatched calls for service in 2025 and made 1368 criminal arrests and those charges are broken down as follows:

- 932 adult misdemeanors
- 339 adult felonies
- 92 juvenile misdemeanors
- 5 juvenile felonies

Traffic Enforcement

- 1295 traffic citations were issued by sheriff's deputies
- 3604 traffic warning were issued by sheriff's deputies
- 388 traffic accident reports were generated by sheriff's deputies

Training

The Clermont County Sheriff's Office prioritizes ongoing training to ensure readiness and compliance with Ohio Peace Officer Training Commission standards. A major recent initiative was a two-week active shooter response program, with each session lasting eight hours. Deputies participated alongside officers from ten other county agencies, emphasizing coordinated tactics for high-risk incidents. Deputies also completed the following specialized in-service training:



- Defensive Driving — 4 hours
- Defensive Tactics — 4 hours
- Mental Health Awareness and Suicide Prevention — 4 hours
- Legal Updates — 3 hours
- Low-Light Shooting and Tactical Operations — 5 hours

Civil Unit

The Civil Unit operates as an integral component of the Road Patrol Division. Pursuant to Ohio law and departmental responsibilities, this unit serves as the primary division for the execution and delivery of civil process. Deputies assigned to the Civil Unit are tasked with the service of various legal documents, including but not limited to, Summonses, Subpoenas, Complaints and other initiating documents in civil lawsuits. In addition, the unit executes court-ordered enforcement actions, which encompass, conducting evictions (forcible entry and detainer proceedings, performing repossessions of personal property, affecting attachments, levies, seizures, and subsequent sales of real or personal property as directed by judicial order.



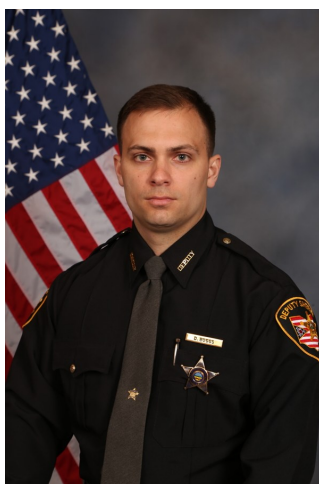
These functions are carried out in strict accordance with the Ohio Revised Code and applicable court directives, ensuring the orderly administration of civil justice while maintaining public safety and due process. The Civil Unit maintains dedicated operational support, including a Civil Process Section accessible Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.



Enhanced Services



Several political subdivisions within Clermont County have secured enhanced law enforcement coverage for their citizens through contracts with the Sheriff's Office. Batavia Township has a contract that provides for eight full-time deputies. The deputies who served the township in 2025 are Jason Kellerman, Joshua Dales, Ethan Eyre, Chase Jester, Kevin Nickell, Cassidy Deimling-Pettit, Bobby Pham, and Dylan Bailey

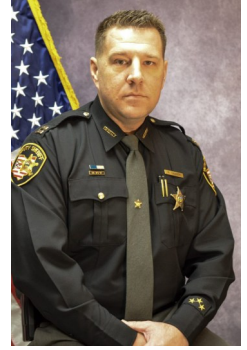

Investigative Division



The Investigations Division is staffed with six full-time detectives, a detective sergeant, and is overseen by Captain Nick Crouch. The primary responsibility is the in-depth investigation of crimes against persons and property in Clermont County. Crimes that escalate to this division are usually more severe, complex or time consuming in nature such as burglary, financial crimes, assault, and homicide, as well as sensitive crimes involving sexual assault or child pornography.

Investigative Division



The S.A.F.E Unit

The S.A.F.E. Unit, (Surveillance, Analysis, and Forensic Evidence) exists to provide specialized support to law enforcement agencies in the collection, preservation, analysis, and dissemination of digital and electronic evidence, as well as Criminal Intelligence or information on Criminal Conduct. The Unit enhances investigations, prosecutions, and public safety initiatives by ensuring evidence and intelligence are handled professionally, ethically, and securely. The unit became operational on November 10, 2025.

The S.A.F.E. Unit operated 2025 at a limited capacity. It will continue to do so until additional funding is secured for staffing.

Public Records



In 2023 the sheriff's office implemented our full-time public records program. In 2025 we received a 27.3 percent increase in public records request going from 2820 requests in 2024 to 3591.

Requests for Body Worn Camera footage increased by 56.9%. We received 137 in 2024 and 215 in 2025.

The largest increase in 2025 was the request for case files from 32 to 60, an increase of 87.5%

On June 23rd, 2025 the sheriff's office started using [NextRequest](#) public records software to manage public records requests. The system allows users to submit and track requests, as well as view previously fulfilled requests in a public archive. Use of the system is optional but encouraged for convenience and transparency.

Narcotics Division



The Clermont County Narcotics Task Force is a multijurisdictional task force with employees from the Sheriff's Office, Miami Township, Union Township, Pierce Township Police Departments and The Ohio National Guard, overseen by the Sheriff and managed by a lieutenant from the Sheriff's Office. The Narcotics Task Force targets mid to upper level narcotics traffickers in all areas of Clermont County.

Special Response Team (SRT)



The Clermont County Special Response Team (SRT) was recently re-named the Clermont County Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team. Clermont County SWAT is a county-wide, multi-jurisdictional team responsible for responding to critical, threatening incidents. In addition to handling barricaded subjects and hostage rescue situations, the team executes high-risk warrants, tracks fugitives, provides protective security details, and supports large-scale events.

The team is composed of specially trained deputies, officers, and paramedics with expertise in tactical operations, crisis negotiation, marksmanship, and tactical medicine. In 2025, members of the Clermont County SWAT Team hosted a two-week active shooter training available to all sworn law enforcement personnel within Clermont County. This training provided participants with critical response strategies and tactics for active-shooter incidents and fulfilled eight (8) hours of annual Continuing Professional Training (CPT) requirements.

Throughout 2025, the Clermont County SWAT Team conducted monthly training, totaling **96 hours**.

Commander Nick DeRose retired from the Clermont County SWAT team in 2025. Commander Nick DeRose was a dedicated team member for over 30 years, holding the positions of tactical operator, tactical team leader, and Commander.

Task Force One (Dive Team)



Task Force One, an underwater search and rescue unit is a partnership between the Clermont County Sheriff's Office, Loveland-Symmes Fire Department and Hamilton County Sheriff's Office. Through its affiliation with Task Force One, the Clermont County Sheriff's Office has acquired access to state of the art water craft, dive, and rescue equipment.

Deputies and jail corrections officers are members of Task Force One. The unit remains proficient by training regularly and has responded to calls for assistance throughout the tristate area. Operations include underwater search, rescue, and recovery of bodies and evidence.

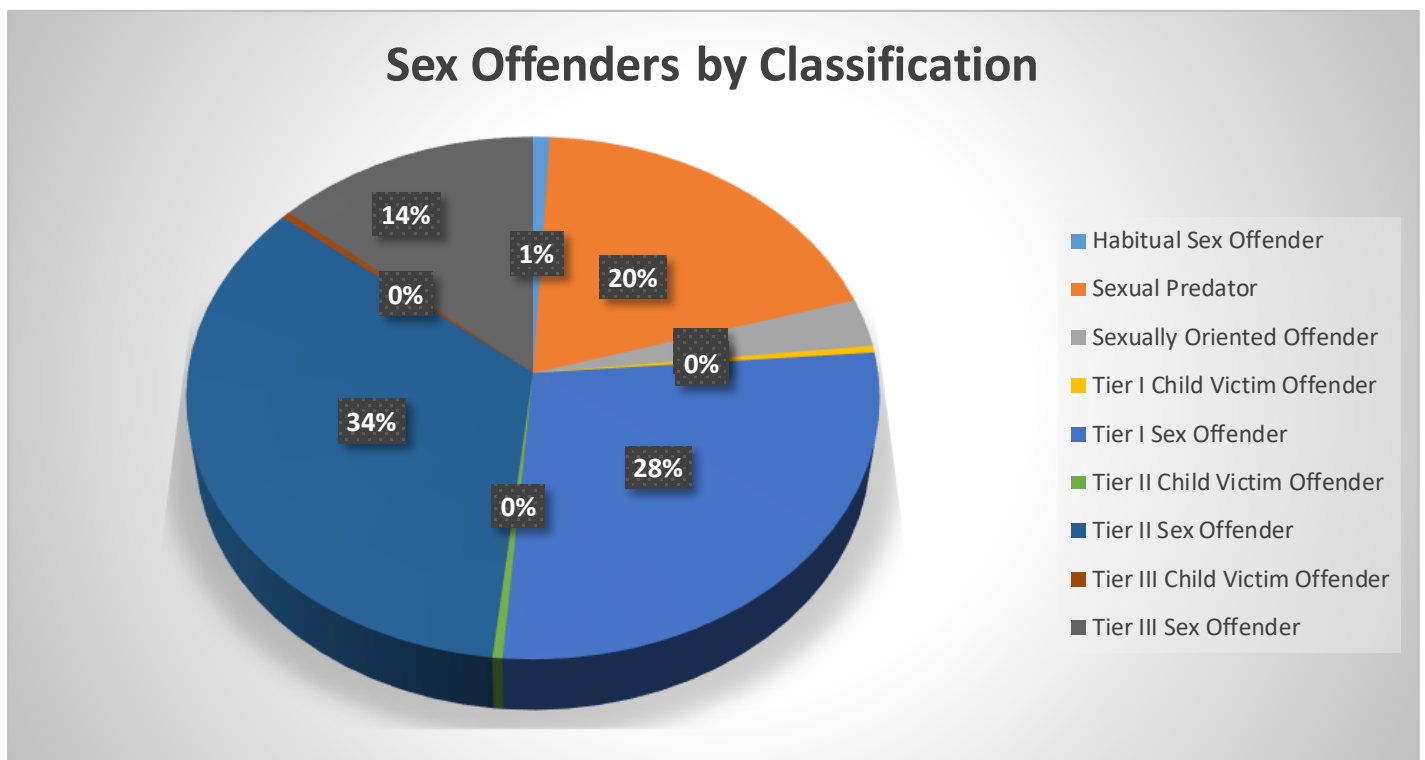

Air Support Unit



The Clermont County Sheriff's Office unit of small unmanned aircraft systems (sUAS) spent much of 2024 training, updating and obtaining the equipment necessary for the "Drone" Unit to operate confidently and safely while within the guidelines of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). The unit is led by Detective Mike Robinson who commands a crew of five. The team is made up of certified FAA part 107 Drone Pilots along with trained Visual Observers who are required for night missions and instances where the pilot can't maintain direct visual contact with the drone.



The Clermont County Sheriff's Office drone unit spent much of 2025 training, updating and obtaining the equipment necessary for the unit to operate confidently and safely while within the guidelines of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). The unit is led by Pilot Mike Robinson who commands a crew of six. The team is made up of certified FAA part 107 Drone Pilots along with trained Visual Observers who are required for night missions and instances where the pilot can't maintain direct visual contact with the drone.

In 2025 the unit acquired a partnership with Mapnova allowing the accessing of software that greatly enhances the Drone Unit's ability to conduct successful search & rescue missions, tactical mapping and improved live streaming capabilities.

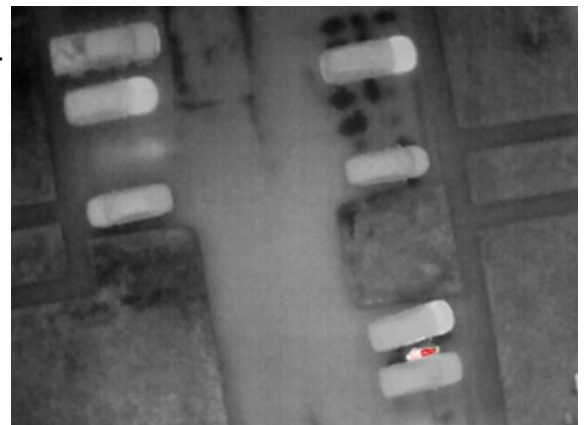
The unit continues to be a focus for calls of service involving S.W.A.T. (Special Weapons and Tactics) operations. With the acquiring of drones capable of indoor flight, we can now in many operations, fly inside a structure. An example may involve when executing a search warrant a drone can be deployed, providing a live feed enhancing the level of safety for law enforcement before any personnel enters the structure. One scene pictured here is from an actual S.W.A.T. callout that one of our drones assisted in determining areas of concern prior to law enforcement personnel entry.

Some of our drones are equipped with the ability of using thermal imaging that can greatly increase the success of a mission, especially in darkness. Pictured below is a suspect in a domestic violence call where the Sheriff's Office was assisting another Clermont County agency. The suspect was located by the drone pilot using thermal imaging. The suspect can be seen attempting to hide between and underneath motor vehicles to escape law enforcement apprehension. The drone pilot was able to direct officers to the suspect location without further incident. The use of having our drones immediately available while on patrol allows for quicker deployment and a higher rate of success.

The capability of live-streaming drone video footage to a Command Center during a natural disaster, provides immediate visuals that assist in the decision making process to utilize resources at a maximum while keeping personnel and citizens involved informed and safer.

In 2025, the Drone Unit flew a total of 26 missions. This was an increase of nearly 37 percent from the previous year.

The Drone Unit's goals for 2026 is to continue to promote public awareness of the advantages the Drone Unit serves and to continue collaborating with other agencies and specialized units leading to the increased availability of resources by sharing this technology.

Internal Investigation Complaints/ Reports

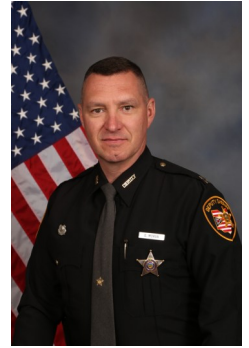
There were twenty internal investigations in 2025. Of these, one of them was the result of a citizen or outside complaint, with the remainder initiated by staff. The staff-initiated complaints resulted in nineteen disciplinary actions, with the other complaint being unfounded.



Court Services Division



The Sheriff's Court Services Division provides security for the county courtrooms and building security. Section 311.07 of the Ohio Revised Code, places the responsibility of the courthouse upon the Sheriff, under the direction and control of the Board of County Commissioners. Court Services is also responsible for transporting prisoners to and from court and to and from state correctional institutions. This division is managed by Captain Greg Moran.

Captain Moran is also the office's Outreach Officer tasked with making personal contact with citizens, organizations, and political entities that wish to express public safety concerns to the sheriff. He has assisted schools with safety practices and policies, engaged in tabletop exercises with West Clermont, Bethel-Tate, Clermont Northeastern, New Richmond and Williamsburg. He has also worked with districts to display anti-drug messages on sports fields and scoreboards. Coordinates with schools during career day events to provide speakers and presentations by Detectives and Deputies for students. Captain, Moran co-chairs and attends monthly meetings with (CARP) Clermont Addiction & Recovery Partnership with Clermont County Mental Health and Recovery.



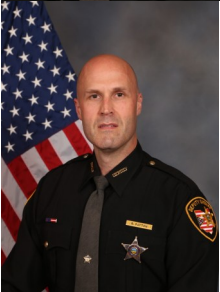
School Resources Officers



A School Resource Officer (SRO) program places deputies in schools with the goal of creating and maintaining a safe, secure, and orderly environment for students, teachers, and staff. SROs are a proactive strategy designed to bring prevention and intervention into the schools. The sheriff's office contracts with five local school districts to provide School Resource Officers.

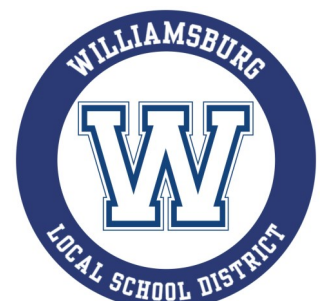

The Opioid Epidemic



The Clermont County Sheriff's Office has taken multiple approaches to handling the opioid epidemic.

Narcan (Naxolone)

Deputies usually arrive on the scene of an overdose before EMS. Clermont County Deputies are equipped with Narcan so they can administer life-saving treatment before EMS arrives. This is a list of Narcan use in 2025.

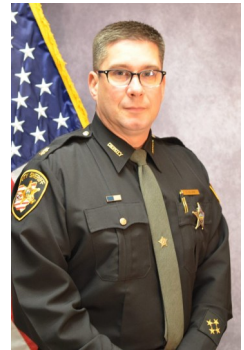

The Sheriff is statutorily responsible for jail operations. In the interest of the public, it is the goal of the Sheriff to operate the jail in a safe, secure and efficient manner while meeting or exceeding Minimum Jail Standards promulgated by the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections. Jail Administrator Major Christopher Allen oversees all aspects of the Clermont County Jail. The jail is currently in compliance with applicable standards.

Operational Software Improvements

During the past year, multiple software solutions were reviewed and demonstrated to improve operational efficiency. Following this review, the facility purchased **Frontline**, a comprehensive software system comprising four integrated platforms to strengthen training, compliance, and personnel management.

Training Compliance and Jail Standards

One Frontline platform tracks required training hours and topics in accordance with Ohio Jail Standards. It ensures accurate documentation and simplifies reporting for annual jail inspections and ongoing compliance.

Field Training Officer (FTO) Tracking

Another platform supports the Field Training Officer (FTO) program for newly hired corrections officers. Supervisors can track training phases, document progress, and ensure a consistent and structured onboarding process.

Policy Management and Accountability

The policy management platform provides centralized access to all jail policies. It supports policy updates and includes automated monthly testing on selected policies identified by supervision, improving awareness, accountability, and compliance across all shifts.

Performance Evaluation Management

The final platform manages annual performance evaluations. It centralizes employee reviews and aligns with the agency's existing evaluation format, ensuring consistency and easy access for supervisors and administration.

Inmate Grievance Process Enhancement

The inmate grievance policy has been updated and is now available on each kiosk **in every housing unit**. This upgrade improves transparency, tracking, and accountability by enabling electronic documentation and monitoring of grievances and responses for each submission.



K9 Program Expansion and Facility Safety

An additional **narcotics detection K9** was added, providing **12-hour day-shift coverage, 365 days per year**, excluding holidays and scheduled vacations. This enhancement improves safety for both inmates and staff. The facility now has two certified Narcotics K9s.

A K9 screens every inmate entering the jail, and all areas of the facility are subject to random K9 searches. This added layer strengthens existing security measures to prevent contraband and maintain a sterile environment, ultimately contributing to a safer facility for employees and inmates.



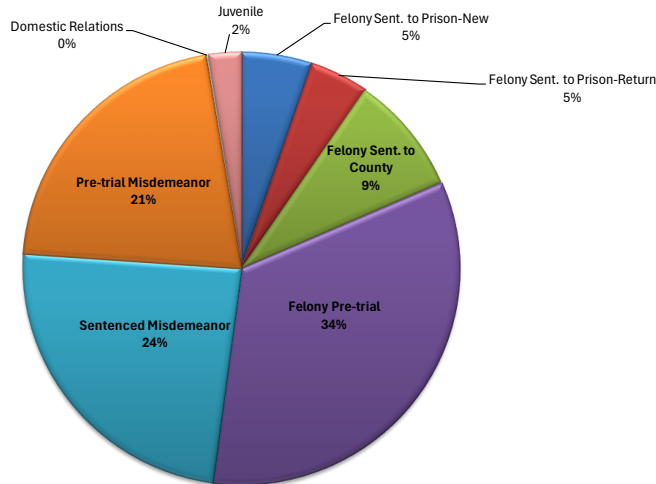

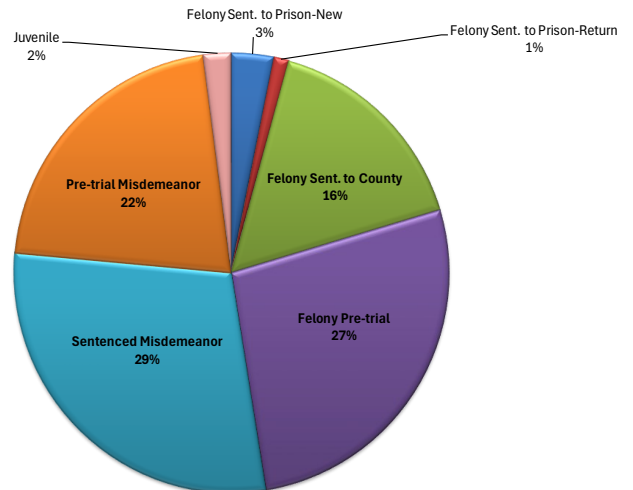

The Clermont County Sheriff's Office partners with local law enforcement agencies each summer to host a free, week-long Junior Police Academy (JPA) for youth ages 13–17. This engaging program brings law enforcement professionals together with young participants to share foundational knowledge, practical techniques, and real-world experiences in policing. Through hands-on activities, demonstrations, and interactions, students gain valuable insights into the realities of law enforcement while building positive relationships with officers in a safe, educational environment.

In 2025, the Clermont County Sheriff's Office partnered with the Pierce Township Police Department, Batavia Village Police Department, and Union Township Police Department to deliver an enriching Junior Police Academy (or Cadet Program) for aspiring young leaders. Each day began with a rigorous physical training session to build discipline and fitness, followed by a diverse lineup of hands-on activities designed to introduce cadets to various aspects of law enforcement. Participants practiced conducting mock traffic stops and explored speed monitoring devices, engaged in an interactive crime scene investigation and evidence collection workshop, observed a live drone demonstration, trained on the advanced firearms simulator, and toured the county's common pleas court and juvenile detention facilities. Cadets also witnessed impressive demonstrations by the Sheriff's Special Response Team and the Task Force One Dive Team, gaining valuable insight into specialized operations. This collaborative program not only provided practical exposure to policing but also emphasized teamwork, respect, responsibility, and pride in service—helping shape the next generation of community-minded public safety professionals.

Shop with the Sheriff

The Shop with the Sheriff program brings holiday joy to children in need by providing them with Christmas presents. Local schools nominate eligible students, and dedicated employees from the sheriff's office team up with generous local businesses to personally shop for the kids, creating meaningful and memorable experiences. This heartfelt initiative is proudly supported and funded by the Deputy Bill Brewer 2055 Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization established in honor of fallen Clermont County Deputy Sheriff Bill Brewer (#2055), who tragically lost his life in the line of duty on February 2, 2019. The foundation continues his legacy of service by giving back to the community, including through this program that helps build positive connections between law enforcement and local youth.





Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board

The Ohio Collaborative, a 12-person panel of law enforcement experts and community leaders from throughout the state, established Ohio's first state law enforcement standards on August 28, 2015. These standards will hold everyone accountable and instill a greater confidence with the public. The Collaborative works closely with partners, including the community and law enforcement agencies, to implement new standards. All law enforcement agencies are expected to meet or exceed these standards as they develop policies and procedures to meet new expectations. The Collaborative also provides model policies as a resource for agencies, and OCJS serves as a contact and is available to assist agencies with implementation. Over 600 law enforcement agencies employing over 29,000 officers (in all 88 counties, representing 87 percent of all law enforcement officers in Ohio and most of Ohio's metropolitan departments) are participating in the certification process.



Training

The Ohio Police Officer Training Academy (OPOTA) requires certified police officers to qualify with their firearms once per year. Clermont County Sheriff's deputies qualify with their firearms twice annually as well as with less-than-lethal and non-lethal weapons such as Tasers and oleoresin capsi-cum or OC Spray once per year. In 2024 all law enforcement officers were required to take 24 hours of training
